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ABOUT UNIHEALTH FOUNDATION

Vision and Mission

UniHealth Foundation is an independent private healthcare foundation. We are committed to becoming a pacesetter in healthcare philanthropy, supporting innovative activities, while provoking and sustaining changes that positively impact health. Our mission is to support and facilitate activities that significantly improve the health and well being of individuals and communities we serve by making grants from two funds:

The Hospital Fund, a restricted fund comprised of most of the Foundation's assets. Charitable expenditures from the Hospital Fund are used exclusively for the purpose of funding healthcare services and programs provided by or through qualified charitable hospitals in specified service areas in Los Angeles and northern Orange Counties. Most grants are made from this fund to benefit residents in four service areas: San Fernando and Santa Clarita Valley; Westside and Downtown Los Angeles; San Gabriel Valley; and Long Beach and Orange County.

The General Purpose Fund, a smaller fund, from which charitable expenditures may be distributed to qualified nonprofit organizations for health-related purposes.

ANNUAL MESSAGE

UniHealth Foundation strives to accomplish its charitable mission in a healthcare environment that is complex, highly fragmented and difficult to navigate. Within this context, we do our utmost to identify and support programs with the potential to impact and improve the health and well being of the communities we serve. In past annual reports we have described how hospitals and community clinics can partner to enable access to care at appropriate points of service. In this annual report we have chosen to highlight examples of hospitals working together, with our support, to accomplish shared objectives. We appreciate that this level of collaboration among established institutions is no easy feat. However, we believe strongly that the shared vision of exceptional clinical and organizational leaders focusing on a common problem can overcome traditional competitive forces that mitigate against cooperation, resulting in stronger programs reaching more people.

UniHealth Foundation affirms its commitment to transparent and strategic grantmaking. Continuous assessment of grant outcomes and the healthcare environment tempered with feedback from our constituents resulted in the revised grantmaking framework included in this annual report. For hospitals, we have identified three priority areas: community health activities, healthcare systems enhancement and workforce development. Within the smaller General Purpose Fund, the Fund for Nonprofit Organizations will provide support for evidence-based health promotion activities and the Innovation Fund will provide opportunities for nonprofit organizations to test creative ideas and promising new practices. Periodically, initiatives will be announced on our updated website www.unihealthfoundation.org.

This past fiscal year defined UniHealth Foundation as a mature grantmaking organization required to distribute fully five percent of its assets in grants to qualifying not-for-profit hospitals and organizations. We continued to act upon our values of partnership and access to care by joining the Children's Health Initiative of Greater Los Angeles, a diverse coalition of public and private entities addressing the critical issue of gaps in insurance coverage for children. Under this banner, UniHealth Foundation funded the feasibility study for implementing One-e-App, a web-based universal enrollment system designed to screen and enroll applicants in multiple publicly funded health programs through a single point of entry. We are optimistic about its adoption and look forward to continuing to work with like-minded organizations to accomplish shared goals.

No application form is needed at this preliminary stage. The Foundation's program staff will screen preliminary letters and advise the applicant of the results of this review. Those selected to submit a full proposal will receive detailed information from program staff.

A grant proposal is a request for funding and not a guarantee of an award. Unfortunately, not every worthy request can be funded; however, UniHealth Foundation will give serious consideration to each qualified application.
